Hydrangea: The Flower of Rainy Season

Every year during the rainy season from around June to July, the hydrangea blooms in beautiful, rich colours of pink, purple, blue and white. Despite the rain, during this time, people flock to parks to see the flower and admire its beauty.

The flower is famous for changing its colour based on the PH level of the soil: hydrangeas planted in soil that is more acidic bloom a blue-ish colour, whereas hydrangeas planted in soil that is more alkaline bloom a deep pink.

In Japan, the fleeting presence of the hydrangea reminds people of how impermanent things can be, so it is often associated with sadness. But it is also said to symbolise heartfelt emotion, understanding and apology. Additionally, a cluster of hydrangeas can represent unity and togetherness, family bond and friendships.

On the other hand, in Victorian Europe, hydrangeas were thought of more negatively. Due to the fact the hydrangea can produce many flowers but very few seeds, the flower was often used to declare arrogance and boastfulness. It is said that English men in the 1800s would sometimes send hydrangeas to women who rejected them as an insult.

On top of this, hydrangeas were thought of as a “taboo flower” that should never be used at a wedding. It was also said that women who grew hydrangeas in their garden would never find a romantic partner.

It's interesting how many different meanings hydrangeas have!



Tamagawadai Park

There are around 3000 hydrangeas blooming in the entire park, most of which can be found in the Hydrangea Garden.
